### **Grouping for Instruction in Literacy: What Works and What ...**

Flexible grouping was defined by Radencich and McKay (1995) as “grouping that is not static, where members of the reading group change frequently” (p. 11). For example students may work with a partner, in a small cooperative or teacher-led group, or with the whole class. The basis for the grouping may be students’ interests or needs.

### **Differentiation Through Flexible Grouping: Successfully ...**

What is Flexible Grouping? Flexible grouping is a flexible way of grouping students together for delivering instruction. This can be as a whole class, a small group, or with a partner. Flexible grouping creates temporary groups that can last an hour, a week, or even a month. It allows students to work together in a variety of ways and configurations depending upon activity and learning outcomes. In order to successfully differentiate instruction through flexible grouping, teachers must ...

### **Flexible Grouping as a Differentiated Instruction Strategy ...**

Flexible Grouping “Warm Up”. Day 1/Grouping 1: Students line up according to birth date (month/day) and the teacher divides them into partners. Day 2/Grouping 2: Students receive a playing card and form “same suit” trios. Day 3/Grouping 3: Students use the same playing card (or a new one) to form “like number” quads.
