Why Do Healthcare Costs Keep Rising?

The cost of health care has been on the rise for several years,

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and in 2018, the average consumer spent \$4,968 on health care. 1 Depending on whether you have health insurance or not, and where you get your health insurance from, your health care costs may vary. Out-of-pocket spending on health insurance increased consistently from 2007 to 2017, with the average cost increasing over 50% from \$435 to \$662. 2.

Not getting enough physical activity comes with high health and financial costs. It can lead to heart disease, type 2 diabetes, some cancers, and obesity. In addition, lack of physical activity costs the nation \$117 billion annually for related health care. 13

Unfortunately, the healthcare cost problem has put the industry in a financial quandary. Recently, Moody's Investors Service reported that hospital median operating margins fell to just 2.7 percent in fiscal year 2016, and operating expenses grew faster (7.5 percent) than operating revenues (6.6 percent).

Effects of Health Care Spending Households In 2002 the most recent year for which data are available the average household spent \$2,350 a year, or 4.8 percent of its income, on health care. This is an increase from 1999, when the average household health expenditure was \$1,959, or 4.5 percent of income.

Medical cost trend in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of the drop in employer healthcare spending in the first half of 2020 and the uncertainty around spending in the second half of the year, HRI is projecting 2021 medical cost trend relative to 2020 estimated healthcare costs, normalizing for

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COVID-19, rather than actual 2020 costs. HRI has developed three scenarios to guide employers and health plans as they determine 2021 medical cost trend:

Adults who are in worse health have more difficulty accessing care due to cost Nearly one in five adults in worse health (19%) said they delayed or did not receive medical care due to cost barriers, while 7% of respondents in better health reported the same.
